He is currently the Membership Trustee on the American Avalanche Association Governing Board, and previously served as the Certified Instructor Rep and worked on the committee to develop the

current Professional Education Standards. He is actively involved in K9 SAR and detection disciplines, both with his own dog and training others. He has been teaching avalanche courses for American Avalanche Institute for 20 years and works as a mountain safety consultant to various organizations and military groups.

Betting Your Life: Why Avalanche Forecasting is Poker, Not Chess

Jenna Malone moved to Jackson, Wyoming, in the 1990s, where she joined the ski patrol at Jackson Hole Mountain Resort and started teaching for NOLS. In 2004, she attended the University of Utah's Physician Assistant program, and in 2007, joined the Neurosurgery, Neuro Critical Care, and Trauma teams at Intermountain Medical Center. When not working as a PA. she is a ski patroller at Alta, a guide with Powderbird, an instructor with the American Avalanche Institute, a medical provider on Denali's West Buttress route, and a newly elected Councilperson for the Town of Brighton, Utah. This past spring, she spent two weeks at New York Presbyterian Queens Hospital during the 2020 pandemic surge, working as a PA in a COVID-19 ICU.

BUD WHEELER

Crew Resource Management: How to Deal with Strong Personalities in the Field

MATT STEEN

Talk it Out: Common Use Radio Channels in High Use Avalanche Terrain 9:0

Matt Steen has been working in the outdoor industry since the mid-1990s. After earning a degree in outdoor leadership with instructional emphasis, he instructed Outward Bound trips throughout Colorado, Wyoming, and California. He began ski patrolling in Crested Butte, then moved to Telluride in 2001. As a patroller and snow safety supervisor in Telluride, he helped the ski area expand into new and uncharted terrain. He finished his patrolling career with an avalanche and feasibility study mapping Bear Creek, a backcountry playground adjacent to the ski area. From 2011-13, he was the North and South San Juan's backcountry avalanche forecaster for the Colorado Avalanche Information Center. In the summer, Matt gets to run through sprinklers as the owner of Telluride Irrigation & San Juan Backflow Services.

HEATHER THAMM 9:40

Scary Low: Forecast Challenges with Low Probability, High Consequence Avalanche Problems

Heather Thamm moved to Alaska in 1998 to attend Alaska Pacific University where she took her first avalanche course. She worked as a ski patroller for Alyeska Ski Resort since 2003 and spent five seasons as an avalanche forecaster for the Chugach National Forecast Avalanche Information Center. She is currently taking a break from forecasting and patrolling to pursue a degree in Fisheries and Wildlife Science through Oregon State University. She continues to keep her head in the snow by teaching avalanche courses with the Alaska Avalanche School and submitting snowpack observations to CNFAIC.

















The Fine Line is a monthly podcast series that tells real stories of adventure, risk and rescue in the backcountry of Jackson Hole, Wyoming.


